

## TOP TIPS FOR READING AT HOME

A recent survey by publisher HarperCollins found a decline in many aspects of reading for pleasure amongst children aged 0-13. We hope to outline some strategies that can make this process enjoyable for all.

The research found that less than half of parents found it fun to read aloud to their children, with many seeing reading as a skill to learn rather than an activity to enjoy. However, the publisher also notes that, importantly, "it's never too late to start, or resume, reading with children."

As a Trust, we recognise and celebrate the willingness of our families to support students' literacy; the strategies below are designed to support getting students back into reading regularly - and reassure parents and carers that you are doing all the right things!

- 1.Reading little and often is incredibly helpful just a few pages or a short article with some talk and discussion will enrich a child's vocabulary and sense of wellbeing.
- 2.Encourage children to **read what interests them** at first-sports articles, non-fiction books that relate to a hobby, graphic novels and texts related to school subjects they enjoy.
- 3. Model being a reader share aloud sections of a text that you have enjoyed/think are worth discussing and encourage your child to discuss these with you.
